Little did I realise that I was taking the initial step towards the responsibility of leading the club and helping it navigate the turbulent waters of change as all groups and businesses adjust to the post-Covid era.

I can assure you that I will be communicating with you frequently, to update you on the opportunities we will be creating for you to re-engage with the club, and to encourage you into the clubhouse. I am very pleased that the Temple Bell is ringing loudly once again and I am pleased to be able to contribute to it. My thanks to Sue Foster for returning as editor.

As we ran up to the AGM it was with the realisation that three important positions would be unfilled. I am pleased to say members have now come forward and will be in post after the forthcoming EGM - more on that later.

On the subject of contact, all club business will be dealt with via the office, during office hours and where possible in person. It is my intention to attend the club every Wednesday between 1pm and 3pm, to be available should you wish to drop in and discuss any club matters face to face. General Committee will take place on the first Friday each month and I and other GC members will be available in the bar from 8.30pm and again will be there to listen to you.

Significant changes are needed in order to return the club to sustainability, the first of these is the change of licence. Many of you will have seen the blue notices around the building during January. Changing from a club licence to a normal pub licence presents us with a great many opportunities to raise income during periods where the membership does not make use of the club. Can I please assure you just because we have a pub licence does not change how we choose to operate and we will absolutely continue in the format of a members' club, but we must start to generate income, and do so expeditiously. As the committee get to grip with the huge task before them, and fresh opportunities arise I will share the developments with you.

We have promoted Barry Stone who is now the Club Manager, he will take over many of the tasks which had migrated to the Honorary Secretary. That role will now be returned to its original focus. The club diary has now been updated on the website to include all the club functions, and more are being added every week. Fridays are already full! Barry along with the Entertainments Committee are working hard to create many reasons to attend the club; the Carvery is back every month as is Games Night and a new music night too. More events will follow, please support them.

Working together is the only way forward for any club and I ask you to work with the Committee and myself to make RTYC once again a fun and exciting place to be part of, and I look forward to seeing you in the club house soon.

RTYC MEMBERSHIP IMPORTANT NOTICE

At the forthcoming **EGM** (Saturday 26 March 2022 at 11.30 a.m) there is a proposal to change an element of our Constitution, and I would like to explain to you why it is there and ask that you support it.

Historically, Clubs work when their cost is spread across its membership, this was how our club was funded many years ago.

At some point in our past, our membership fees fell short and, sadly, it went unchallenged. At that point we unknowingly entered a financial downward spiral. We reduced services to reflect our shortfall, and members left. We had even less, we reduced services, more members left, and so it went on. Covid did not help but neither did it stop the repetition.

Now we have a simple choice, carry on in the same way and see the RTYC close, or do something to change it and seek a resurgence of the club.

Your Committee strongly believe that the club can be saved and have voted unanimously to do so and it is the membership aspect of the plan that we ask you, the Members, to vote for at the EGM.

From the start of our next membership year, we propose that ALL the existing membership categories end, to be replaced with 5 new categories.

- 1. Full Membership £200
- Club Membership £125 a trial membership of one year, then until the next club renewal date.
- 3. Club Joint £200 as 2 above but for couples.
- Crew Membership £50 for members of RTYC boat crews who must sail a minimum of three days per season. Be proposed by a skipper and seconded by the relevant Rear Commodore.
- 5. Honorary Membership £0. Individuals who have sufficient status to bring benefit to the RTYC and who are granted Honorary Membership by the Committee. This shall be reviewed annually in October and confirmed at the following AGM by the members.

Some members will see a financial benefit from this system as it treats single members more fairly, as individuals, it treats partners as full members rather than an add-on. Current couples will see no change in fees at this time. Veterans, in some cases, are adversely affected and I apologise for that, but we are no longer financially able to discount any

membership. You will be asked to pay the same as any other member.

However, we do not want to lose any of our members who have brilliantly supported the club over the years, we will find an option to help you stay wherever possible. If you are concerned about how this will affect your membership, speak to me and I will find the best solution to offer you.

These changes, in fact, create a shortfall in revenue, so you might ask why we are doing it. It is simple:

- Members are leaving because the club activities do not justify the current cost - so we reduced the fees.
- New members will not join it is too expensive
 so we have reduced the the fees.
- Ex-members will not return at the price so we reduced the fees.

All of this requires your support:

- Support the membership changes.
- Support the bar by attending functions.
- Support the restaurant by booking.
- Support the club by having a function at the club house.
- Invite friends and family to the club, and to join the club.

We need 40 new members by October to help us to make the transition and a huge effort will be made to secure those new members.

Lastly, come in and help. Many of our subcommittees urgently need members to support their activity. An obvious example is that it is Platinum Jubilee Year and Entertainment is being run by one Member, single-handedly!

If you have questions - ask me. I'm in the club every Wednesday 1pm to 3pm or email me via the office. I will do everything I can to ensure you fully understand what your club is trying to do and why.

Finally, please support your Committee at the EGM and vote to amend our membership so that we can drive the club forward, get new members, increase the club activities and make the club house the thriving, fun hub for sailing that it can be.

THE 200 CLUB

The Club holds a **200 Club Draw** at the end of each month with a **Big Draw** at the end of January and I am hoping that you will consider joining the Draw.

The money is used for prizes for members and to assist in the maintenance of the Club building and the purchasing of items for the benefit of the members. These past few years, money has been provided to redecorate the snooker room, purchase the terrace furniture and contributed towards the renovation of the fabric of the building.

The **200 Club** has been in place for many years and those contributing are helping to pay for the items required by the club that are, perhaps, not essential, but go towards making the clubhouse special. Over the years we have purchased the leather chairs in the lounge, paid the extra to have our badge woven into the carpet, provided the comfortable chairs in the dining room, paid for new curtains for the club and helped with the hold bar refurbishments. All these improvements have been made possible by the additional funding provided by the **200 Club**. Later this year it is hoped that the Ladies toilets will be refurbished.

The **200 Club** costs £60 a year, which is paid by standing order in annual or monthly instalments. Each month a draw is held with prizes of £200, £100, £50, £25. In addition, at the end of January in each year, we hold the **BIG DRAW** with prizes of £2500, £1000, and 2 X £500 available.

I hope that you will join the **200 Club** and help maintain our clubhouse and preserve that special atmosphere which is admired by all our visitors and members alike.

THE FULL 2022 RACING PROGRAMME IS NOW FINALISED AND IS ON THE CLUB WEBSITE

CLUB MEMBER, PETER THOMAS, HAS SHARED THIS EXCITING NEWS

My son, James, will be flying out soon to the Philippines to join the Clipper Round the World fleet presently moored in Subic Bay. He's had to wait two long years for the opportunity to race the north Pacific leg due to Covid. The eleven yachts' crews will have to undertake refresher training for a few days as many of them are They will then have a short race of approximately 600-700 miles to fulfil the number of races to count towards the overall standings before embarking on a non-stop race across the Pacific. Their track will take them around the top of the Philippines, across to the bottom of Japan and then up the east coast of Japan, all probably into a prevailing wind. After leaving Japanese waters they should pick up easterlies from one depression after another and will be taking a great circle route across the Pacific ending up in Seattle.





5th March 1924 – 22nd December 2021

It was so very, very sad to lose an outstanding and good friend recently. He was a Past Commodore (1990-1992) and sailor extraordinaire. He was also our unofficial "historian" who researched our archives to bless us with many stories of our illustrious past from the very beginning on the Temple Steps in London to the famous early members and esteemed racing yachts they sailed.

Below is a reprint of his last contribution to the newsletter.

LOST TROPHIES

In April 1988 we had a serious robbery; thieves broke into the Trophy Cabinet in the bar and stole a collection of our silverware.

A neighbour reported that after failing to start a car near the Tidal Ball, they were seen running down Cliff Street carrying bags. (The getaway car was stolen from the forecourt of Dumpton Garage.) No more was heard of them and it seemed that this was going to be another unsolved crime.

Some years later we had a telephone call from the Hemel Hempstead Police in Hertfordshire. They asked if one of our lost trophies had a Viking Ship emblem. This was, indeed one of the features of the Europa Cup. Saying this, we were asked if we could come to Hemel Hempstead to examine a collection of pieces that they had impounded.

Brian Martin and I were taken to the station where we were shown a heap of scrap metal. Clearly these had been cups and salvers; all had the Hallmarks removed and engravings buffed out but there, in all its glory, was our Viking Ship.

A closer examination of the pile showed the arms of the cup. Piece by piece we could identify other items of our collection and, except for two items, all totally ruined. These two items were the Telescope and the Temple Mug. The Mug had been presented to the Club by Dick Walsh. The engraving had been buffed out and the Hallmark cut out but re-soldered into place again. This gave a clue as to what had happened to the Trophies. In their original state they would be difficult to sell but their Hallmark could be used on modern material giving "age" and so a piece made yesterday could be passed off to the gullible as being made in the reign of George IV with a very enhanced value.

There is a very interesting story of how our trophies came to be in Hemel Hempstead. It begins with a series of robberies in the Home Counties that were under investigation. One day a member of the Hemel Hempstead Crime Squad recognised a possible suspect in the town and apprehended him. Under questioning, the suspect admitted to being involved in

a life of crime and decided to go straight. He cooperated fully under questioning until asked how he disposed of the stole goods and now he prevaricated for some time. Eventually, he gave the name of a firm in Ramsgate (he, himself, was not involved in any of the crimes in that part of the country).

Now we come to the interesting part of the story: Hemel Hempstead police decided to raid the Ramsgate premises. They did this without the involvement of the local police force. They raided the premises of a jewellery shop in the High Street and found the silverware and a quantity of a jewellery from a local jeweller who had also suffered from a series of robberies.

The sequel to this was that the owner of the High Street premises was charged at St Albans Court and on trial was found Not Guilty. The jury accepted the view that the manager of the shop had bought the scrap in good faith. We recovered some of trophies but in a very sorry state of SCRAP.
