

TWO ARCs & TWO VERY DIFFERENT EXPERIENCES

Last November I flew to Gran Canaria to join the crew of *Panther* a Grand Soleil 43 for my second Atlantic crossing.



I've sailed on *Panther* before, 1st was a Round the Island race, then several JOG races and then the 2018 Caribbean 600. In big trade winds 44 of the 80 strong fleet retired whilst *Rambler* set a course monohull record. Unfortunately, we retired after just 90 miles with a ripped mainsail. For the owner of *Panther*, David Hall, and his crew this became known as UNFINISHED BUSINESS. And so, a plan emerged to return and try to complete the C600 in 2020. Plans were made, the crew signed up instantly for the C600, including Pip Hare and Alex Alley. Now, how to get *Panther* from Malta to Antigua? In 2018 David shipped her from Southampton. This time he decided he would sail if he could get the crew and join the 2019 ARC Plus.

When he asked if I would join the him for the ARC Plus I agreed straight away. I know *Panther* and I know David and I know that the passage would be planned very carefully and competently. And so, it was. Nothing left to the last minute. Everything tried and tested. It was a textbook crossing. I even managed to get in some sun sightings in prep for Ocean Master!



What a difference to my 1st crossing in 2016. *Scarabaus*, a 50-foot Sweden yacht is a beautiful blue water cruiser and handled trade winds and the big Atlantic waves fantastically. However, she was not as prepared as *Panther* for an ocean passage and suffered some last-minute difficulties. The result was that some of the boat systems failed. The house battery charge alternator failed in the first week, and everything relying on electricity slowly packed up as the voltage dropped. We could not access the water tanks. We were becalmed for four days which challenged the provisioning plan. We ran out of gas four days before

reaching St Lucia. We did have the engine cranking battery and alternator which we jury rigged a cigar lighter to power the Sat phone and get a midday Lat and Long for navigation. And, thankfully, I had my hand-held GPS and a bunch of batteries, (literally last-minute item I packed thanks to Paul Woodward!).

However, and given all this, I still enjoyed the crossing and it was one hell of an experience. Before the crossing I read Tom Cunliffe's book on Heavy Weather Cruising and very glad I did that. This helped me immensely. We did not experience any heavy weather, just a squall here and there and some sustained 30 knot winds. But in his book Tom made four key points when dealing with heavy weather.

- I. Make sure there is no sea water coming aboard don't sink!
 - a. No problem for *Scarabaus*, she handled the big seas fine and was great surfing down them, dry too.
- II. Means of propulsion you need to get to land.
 - a. Again, no problem for *Scarabaus* and we ran under full mainsail most of the crossing and, in fact, we made up a lot of places in the last week.
- III. Navigation where are you and where do we need to go?
 - Thankfully we had the sat phone which gave us a Lat and Long and we used my hand held 3 days from St Lucia
- IV. Provisions do you have enough water and food.
 - After the first week we were becalmed for 4 days and this did concern us and kept a close eye on drinking water consumption and food that did not require cooking.


So, these four key points helped focus on what was important. Yes, it's not great having no electricity, head torches only for light, no fridge, no water maker, no GPS plotter and only one cooked meal per day and no tea or coffee to preserve gas and having to wash everything in sea water. But *Scarabaus* kept us safe, we had great propulsion, knew where we were going and provisions to get there. And yes, the 1st shower on land was marvellous.

Quite the contrast to Panther's text book crossing.

David has now moved *Panther* from St Lucia to Antigua and on the 20th February, we fly back and get ready for the **C600 UNFINISHED BUSINESS.**


